Our website quality reporting tool also has an accessibility module, which will guide us on achieving the Website Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0.

- We have examined and taken on board the annual Society of IT Managers (SOCITM) annual report which highlights the best and the worst aspects of local authority websites. This includes benchmarking against the top 20 UK websites.
- We have taken courses and guidance from the Plain English Campaign, which highlights how the removal of jargon and badly written content can improve accessibility and understanding.
- We are working to WCAG 2.0 accessibility standards to ensure that people with a variety of needs and disabilities can access the website.
